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Editor's Say

First, Amazon has made it so easy to self-publish that some folks think they don't have to follow the rules. I'm going to tell you "follow the There are a lot of very fine small publishers out there, so try a few before you throw up your hands and decide the book world is against you and you must self-publish. Because they are small, they may have an editor or two that will happily give you some advice on what your manuscript needs. LISTEN! Open your mind and Pay attention. That old false belief that being published is a closed club and once you are published you want to keep everyone out is simply a false belief. I've found most published writers are happy to provide suggestions if you are willing, if you don't argue and just take their suggestions to heart.

When I began writing I met a wonderful lady named Pat Stadley who told me some things I needed to fix in my writing. Granted it was painful, but I did it. I sold one to a Sunday School paper and the other to a big-time equine magazine who paid major bucks. I wouldn't have sold either one without Pat's help or suggestions.

Much like Marcella Meeks, whose article is in this issue, I started with articles for children because they are the most decerning readers. They may not know all the editing information, but because they know what they like.

The bottom line is the writer must know his or her audience. If you self-publish this is even more important than selling your work to a major publishing house.

Whatever you do, read a few books on how to write for your particular audience, and keep learning. It is a great adventure. Read, read, and read some more.

am a writer and want to write children's picture books and early readers but it hasn't worked out for me. I do write children's stories for *Primary Treasure*, *Our Little Friend* and *Guide* (PACIFIC PRESS) on a regular basis but I haven't mastered writing children's books yet.

After a lot of thinking, I made up my mind to schedule a little reading time at the local library for at least an hour a day, Monday through Friday. How can I write children's books if I don't read any?

There were so many books on that shelf that "I hardly knew where to start reading. The helpful librarian showed me the picture book and early readers section and I picked out several and checked them out. Not really knowing which ones to check out, I chose the following selection:

- 1. The Three Horrid Little Pigs, by Liz Pechon;
 - 2. *Stick*, by Irene Dickson;
- 3. *Two I for Twins*, by Wendy Cheyettel Lewison;
- 4. Stomp, Stomp! A Dino Romp, by Bob Kolar.

I just read *THE THREE HOR-RID LITTLE PIGS* by Liz Pichon, published in 2008. It wasn't my intention to write a full review but only to read it and get an idea how this book was written and different from the original classic. My intention (in all honesty) is to learn how to write books for children myself. Boy, do I have my work cut out for me!

In the beginning I dreaded the thought of reading an old classic by a different author because the one I read as a child was my favorite and it didn't need to be rewritten in any way. The old version was just fine! (My opinion!). It wasn't that I didn't think an author could pull it off (and do it so well). The original classic didn't need to be rewritten or changed. I already did that with my version entitled THE THREE STINGY LITTLE PIGS that never got published. Then here comes Liz Pichon with her version which brought a new approach to an old tale, making it more true to life and so much better. I am an adult, and a mother and grandmother, and I could identify the bad little pigs characters as similar to my own children (grands) in a lot of ways.

It was an amazingly good children's book. Ms. Pichon pulled it off with twists and turns that not even a writer like me could ever possibly do so well. The story reminded me so much of my four sons when they were growing up, in some ways. There was also a moral lesson to learn that I grasped when the wolf came calling. The three little pigs were rude, lazy. The wolf was actually very charming and offered to help them, and in the end, offered his hospitality to the three little pigs and the other farm animals (look

at the pictures on the last two pages where they all lived happily ever after.) That was a nice ending and my favorite part. Kids know that not everyone is rude or lazy and that not everyone is mean.

The story was fastpaced to some degree, keeping the reader on their seat to find out what was happening next. At any moment the wolf was expected to turn mean but didn't. Each scene took place on the farm from what I can gather from the illustrations. The wolf in this version is actually the builder. He offers his help instead of wanting to eat the little pigs.

I don't think there is any part of the story that I would change - the interesting twists throughout the book are inspiring. Children will have so many interesting questions when they read this book. They will probably want to know up front why the little pigs were the way they were and why the big bad wolf wasn't so bad after all. Being an adult, I wanted to know! The book left me with a sense of satisfaction that all that is well, ends well.

After several years of conducting classes as the founder of the Chilmark Writer's Workshop on Marthas Vineyard personal essayist, Nancy Slonim Aronie has written a book on writing personal essays. She is a frequent contributor to NPR. She uses the best of her students essays to illustrate her seven secrets.

Some secrets to consider:

- 1. Start with a compelling sentence
- 2. Introduce a Dramatic Scene
- 3. Discover and Reveal a New Insight about yourself
 - 4. Be Vulnerable
 - 5. Use direct quotes



Louise Arner Boyd inherited millions of dollars when her parents died. Totally alone in the world, she wondered at thirty-two years old what she would do with her life. PURPOSE OF THE CONTEST:

The purpose of the National Writers Assn. Novel Contest is to encourage the development of creative skills, recognize and reward outstanding ability in the area of novel writing.

CONTEST RULES:

Any genre or category of novel manuscript may be entered. All entries must be postmarked by April 1. Only unpublished works may be submitted. All manuscripts must be typed, double-spaced, in the English language. Maximum length is 100,000 words. Those unsure of proper manuscript format should request Research Report #35.

The entry must be accompanied by entry form (photocopies are acceptable), entry fee of \$35 per submission, and return SASE if you wish the material and rating sheets returned. **SUBMISSIONS WILL NOT BE RETURNED WITHOUT SASE.** The U.S. Postal Service will not allow us to use your metered postage unless it is undated. Receipt of entry will not be acknowledged without a return postcard. Author's name and address must appear on the first page. Entries remain the property of the author and may be submitted during the contest as long as they are not published before the final announcement of winners.

JUDGING AND PRIZES

Judging will be based on originality, marketability, research, and reader interest. Copies of the judges evaluation sheets will be sent to entrants furnishing an SASE with their entry. First through fifth place awards will be presented at the annual NWAF Conference. 1st Prize -- \$500 and possible representation; 2nd Prize -- \$250; 3rd Prize -- \$150; 4th through 10th places will receive a book of the winner's choice. Honorable Mentions receive a certificate.

ENTRY FEE AND CRITIQUES

The entry fee per submission is \$35. If you wish to have your submission critiqued, please request this on the entry form. Entry fees are used to pay judges and prize money.

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SCHOLARSHIP CRITERIA AND APPLICATION

MISSION STATEMENT:

The National Writers Association Foundation exists to enhance the future of writers by fostering continuing education through awarding scholarships, and providing low or no cost workshops and seminars. A non-profit organization, we provide education and an ethical resource for writers at all levels of experience.

SELECTION CRITERIA:

Scholarships will be awarded on a merit basis regardless of age, location, or any other bias. Applicants interested in pursuing further education in one of the writing disciplines are given preference. Please state on the application which type of award you are applying to receive.

The following awards are currently available to applicants: 2 fully paid scholarships to the National Writers Association Foundation Conference, held annually the second weekend in June -- approximate value \$250 per scholarship; 1 Tuition free Scholarship to the National Writers School (value approx. \$400); 1 Cash award scholarship of \$1,000 no use restriction.

An internship at the National Writers Association headquarters is also available to interested students enrolled in a qualified college, high school HERO, or vocational education program. To apply for this internship, please complete the attached form and state you are applying for the internship rather than a scholarship.

Attach to this form, an example of your best work. (Please do not exceed 20 double-spaced pages. Single spaced pages will not be considered.) This may be a short story, screenplay, article, essay, or several pages of a novella or novel.

If you are currently a student, please attach a copy of your most recent grade transcript. Scholarships will not be awarded on basis of academic standing, however grades in English-related subjects will be a mitigating factor in the event of otherwise equally qualified applicants.

Deadline for application submissions is December 31 annually. No exceptions can be made for this deadline due to the time necessary for the committee to make a decision.

AUTHORSHIP GUIDELINES

PURPOSE: Authorship magazine is the "in-house" publication for the National Writers Assn. It is read by thousands of members on a quarterly basis. Currently the magazine is a 10 to 241 page publication with a four color cover.

SCOPE: Articles submitted for consideration to Authorship should have a writing slant. Material should deal with writing "how-to's" or current market trends. We are overstocked on inspirational "How I became a successful writer..." type material and will not be interested in any of these articles. Articles slanted toward aspects of fiction—creating characters, setting scenes, etc. are of interest and will be our primary interest. Humor is a plus — writing is serious enough without a totally serious article.

We do not accept fiction. Poetry is published in our winter issue, if it has a writing theme.

SUBMISSIONS: All submissions should be in standard manuscript format, approximately 1,250 to 1,500 words, accompanied by an SASE if the material is to be returned. Authorship uses AP style with the exception of state abbreviations. If the author is not aware of proper manuscript format, they should request NWA RR#35 prior to submitting. Manuscripts accepted for publication will be requested via e-mail in Microsoft Word format in text files with line breaks. NO tabs, fancy fonts, bullets, charts, or tables. If charts or tables are necessary, submit them like art work. Electronic files will be given preferred treatment as this prevents typos in final copy.

Sharp clear photos of article authors will be requested if material is accepted.

PAYMENT: We are currently paying \$10 honorarium per article or a \$10 reduction on membership dues.
